The single scientists took part in an enterprise activity where they had to design, produce and market a new drinks product.



Languages Events and Opportunities at Braintree Sixth Form for KS4 Students

The last few months have been packed with language events and opportunities for our KS4 students at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form. It started in the summer term where our most talented linguists took part in a language masterclass at Braintree Sixth Form where other students from the consortium schools came to join them.

Students' feedback was very positive and they had a great time with our sixth formers turning into teachers for the day and offering an introduction to their own mother tongue in Russian, Italian, Portuguese and Hungarian. Students then studied a film in either French and Spanish and ways to analyse and comment on them.

Then just before half-term on Monday 13 and Friday 17 October, top Year 11 linguists in French and Spanish were given the opportunity to explore the life of a student at Braintree Sixth Form. Students had their double lesson taught in the sixth form, including visiting the library to experience what they described as a relaxed working atmosphere, and had refreshments during break.

Students enjoyed and appreciated being given the opportunity to speak to some of the Year 12 students and asked questions about the transition between GCSE and A level/IB at the sixth form.

As it was a double lesson, there was a short break in between where we were provided with food and drink; which was a nice incentive!"

Most KS4 languages students have been given the opportunity to visit Braintree Sixth Form in one way or another, however this session really gave them the opportunity to experience it first-hand.

During the Impact Day on Wednesday 5 November, Year 11 students embarked on a press conference with an alien who spoke French and Spanish. Students responded really well to this activity as they worked in groups and researched their answers with various resources including mini-ipads.

Bryony Carter, MFL trainee, supported this event with her experience in guiding Year 11 students into their chosen paths and college/university choice. During the French and Spanish session Miss Carter was able to discuss from her point of view, how she made the choices to study French and Spanish at university and the students were able to relate to her experience and discuss languages as a career path.

I was very pleased to see many Year 11 students at the recent Braintree Sixth Form Open Evening

who are planning to come and study either French or Spanish. Some expressed an interest in Italian Ab Intio too. I also recognised many students from consortium schools who took part in the masterclass in the summer and it was nice to discuss their future involvement with Modern Foreign Lamguages (MFL).

If you want to discuss any aspects of languages at the Sixth Form please do not hesitate to come and see me or any of the language teachers in school. We offer French and Spanish at A level and IB at standard and higher level, as well as Spanish and Italian at Ab Initio level. I have included examples of work from Year 12 students who started Spanish/Italian in September 2014.

Thank you to all Braintree Sixth Form students who ran some of the sessions during the Impact Day and all MFL staff who supported the events.




Ingredientes:

Hopefully the students gleaned a lot of information which, combined with their trip to Ypres a couple of weeks later, will help them achieve well in their upcoming WW1 assessments for History!

Student Report

On Tuesday 4 November, Year 9 took part in Khaki on Campaign presented by Corporal Knight in Braintree Arts Theatre. Half the year group experienced the event during lessons 1 and 2 and the other half during lessons 3 and 4.

The Corporal was quick to settle the students; he treated them a bit like soldiers which was brilliant for the event as it was about World War 1 – or the Great War. He also made them answer him by saying 'Yes Corporal!' and had volunteers go down to the front to dress up in the soldier's uniform. At the front of the theatre stage, there was a display of weapons, uniforms and many other things as well. This display took up the entire length of the stage.

The Corporal started by telling the students a little bit about himself and how his grandfather was a soldier in the Great War. When he was there, he was caught in the second gas attack. Those that had been caught in the first gas attack soon died from having been in the next one; but because this man was only in the second one, he survived. The Corporal said that the doctors in the trench hospital saw a tear fall down the side of his cheek. They obviously thought that dead men do not cry and so took him off for proper treatment. He came out with one lung and then could only speak for a short amount of time before needing to stop to breathe deeper. Unfortunately, he died at the age of 92. Corporal Knight told us how his grandfather was his inspiration to look further into World War 1 and begin doing presentations like this.

He went on to explain a little about how it was before the war started – how it was to be known as the Great War, how Germany envied Britain and how France had built forts around their borders for defence. Apparently, Belgium was just an excuse to go to war and besides, Germany needed to go through there in order to get to France; during which time, London helped or protected Belgium where they could.

The Corporal told the students about the number of troops and how many men each army had. They were told that Britain would have over 5 million men when they called upon their empire. Soon after the war had started, Britain was beginning to need men and so the recruiting began. Corporal Knight explained that after 1 month, over 1 million men wanted to join the army. However, many were under age; if you were 16, you could be a boy soldier, 18, you could join the army and 19 you could go overseas. According to records, the youngest lad was 14 years old and he died of his wounds. After clarifying that, the Corporal went on to explain when the soldiers got their uniforms and what they did while they waited.

Next he went on to explain what the soldiers' uniform was like. For this he had students go down to the front to put uniforms on. He showed them that the first uniform was a red tunic; their packs though went across their chests – the straps that is - making a target for the enemy. By this, I mean that it would



be an 'X' mark – 'X marks the spot'. The students were told that the soldiers dyed their uniforms with tea or coffee in order to make it darker and more camouflaged – soon after this uniforms were created this way. We were then showed the next uniform.

After that he told them about how many miles worth of trenches there were – 350 miles+ from the top of Belgium to Switzerland – and how there were no toilets. He also went on to express the fact that 118 boys under 18 were killed in the first day of the Battle of the Somme. In addition to that, he told and showed everyone about the winter uniform and then the second uniform.

Moreover, he talked about how much they carried and what it weighed. He also clarified that a soldier had his coat weighed after he came back from No-Mans-Land, it weighed 56 pounds and was full of mud and water. On top of that, soldiers had to carry 65-70 pounds worth of packs every day for 20 miles. On from that, he talked about how doctors would treat wounds and how the soldiers would get rid of lice.

Following that, Corporal Knight moved on to talk about how the Germans used a weapon of warfare which had been banned. They used gas but worked around the rules by using chlorine and would wait for the wind to send it across. He then talked about the 5 different gas masks and how each one worked. For this, he asked for volunteers to go to the front to put them on.

Overall, Year 9 took pleasure in the presentation

and found it most enjoyable. It was full of interesting facts and humour as well. Those that went to take part in the exhibition will probably not regret it as they seemed to be delighted with Corporal Knight's performance.

Year 9 students were privileged to take part in a number of different workshops as part of 'Hate Crime Awareness' organised by James Martin and Greenfields Community Housing, in partnership with Essex Police. The purpose is to increase knowledge of what hate crime is and how to respond to it; encouraging reporting and promoting local support services and resources.



The programme was introduced to the whole year group in Braintree Arts Theatre where students entered through a metal detector, with a staged 'arrest' taking place. This was followed by a performance from Colchester Institute Performing Arts students who highlighted the dangers of carrying a knife. Students were also visited by Andrea Bennett who experienced hate crime herself when her sister, Tina Bennett, was sadly stabbed to death in Braintree in 2011. These sessions have been thought provoking and memorable for our students and we would like to thank James, Andrea and the police for taking the time to spread the word about the impact hate crime can have on people's lives.

Before we went to watch the show we all went to Covent Garden, we where allowed to see all the beautiful craft shops and chocolate shops and the smell of the food was amazing.


After, we went to see the show, I think everybody had such a fun time. It is amazing how much time and





The story was really good and easy to follow. There were only 4 actors so they had to change characters but they were really good. When we got to the break everyone rushed out to get some glasses that you




had been told to collect.

Year 11's stimulus is 'Paint it Black' by The Rolling Stones. They have had to create a performance using this as a starting point and this must be performed in the style of Steven Berkoff. She is the co-writer of 'Theatre in Practice: A Student's Guide' and has a vast amount of experience in performance, as well as working with young people on a variety of workshops and longer running projects. 




They were able to work with artist printmakers and use professional printmaking equipment. Extending their use of media and techniques, they returned with a variety of finished linocuts and etchings. These finished pieces have provided material for further sketchbook developments all contributing to the first unit of the course. Students were pleased to be able to display some of their work during our recent Open Evening and will be holding a full exhibition during the Arts Festival in June.

Curwen Print

Study Centre



Sophie Vaughan, AS Level Art student writes:

Our trip to the Curwen Print Studio was an educational, fun and messy experience. When taking on the first task of lino printing we all had a huge challenge to conquer which was being able to pull the beautiful old press all the way down without any assistance, (many of us, including myself, not succeeding).

Excluding the strength challenge, using the lino press was fun and gave us all some amazing results. Everyone had a go at layering colours and using the rollers to apply the sticky, bright, printing ink. We also blocked out certain sections of our lino blocks using paper shapes, creating some very colourful, interesting prints.

We got a rest from the physical challenge when we

experimented with the drypoint printing method. We all took a picture or drawing from our own work in our sketch books and scratched them into acetate with very sharp needles. We then rubbed ink on top of the engravings allowing the ink to sink into the tiny lines. We removed all the rest of the ink with cloth and then placed the acetate on a roller press with our paper.

After turning the huge wheel and removing our prints, we all got some amazing results once again. Everyone experimented with different colours and different compositions with their prints, creating some fantastically professional prints.

The techniques we learnt at the studio are ones we will never forget. With the help from the lovely ladies at Curwen we were all able to have a great day out, having fun and experimenting, while also producing some amazingly professional looking outcomes.

We now look forward to reviewing the group's presentation and seeing them complete the other sections of the award so that they can collect their gold award.


