Wellbeing

As a school we recognise and have to manage an increased amount of issues presenting themselves from students that fall within the umbrella of poor mental health. It is important for the whole-school community to feel comfortable when discussing these worries and treat them with the same level of care and compassion as any other illness, without prejudice and without stigma.



Last month, Jo Morton-Brown, our school counsellor, delivered the MHFA Champion course to 15 members of Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form staff. These staff members undertook specific training which will enable them to be in a better position to support any student who feels they need it; this can be done either by a one-to-one conversation in school or by simply signposting a student to alternative support depending on each student's needs.

Making Generation R Presentation

On Thursday 6 May 2021, our Year 8, 9 and 10 students had the privilege of participating in a webinar with Making Generation R and Blesma, The Limbless Veterans. The Making Generation R campaign supports injured veterans to share inspiring stories



about overcoming adversity and we were able to listen to David Ledger's incredibly brave story. He shared details of his time competing as a slalom canoeist before joining the RAF. Sadly, David suffered injuries which left him paralysed but told students how he channelled his frustration into overcoming adversity and becoming incredibly resilient. Rather than giving up, David has embraced parenthood, studied to become a Health Promotion Practitioner now working for the NHS as a Stop Smoking Advisor and he has also volunteered with Blesma for the past 7 years.

Learning to be resilient can make a big difference to anyone who struggles with feelings of anxiety and low self-esteem. One of the most effective ways to encourage resilience is through inspiration from others who have overcome difficulties in their lives. This session gave our students the opportunity to learn real coping strategies through hearing how David faced adversities, overcame these and went on to set and achieve his goals.

The final part of the session gave students the opportunity to ask questions and we were incredibly impressed with both the quantity of questions but also the level of maturity that students showed when asking David some very thought provoking questions.

Teaming up with Tanzania

Good afternoon, or mchana mwema, as they say in Tanzania!

I am excited to announce that Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form has established an international partnership with five other schools to collaborate on achieving one of the United Nations' goals.

Two of the schools are local to us: John Ray Junior School and Notley Green Primary School. We are also connecting with three schools in Tanzania: one at secondary level and two primary schools.

The partnership is part of a project called 'Connecting Classrooms' and aims to help pupils to understand the big issues that shape the world and provide them with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that they need to make a positive contribution. Connecting Classrooms through Global Learning is a partnership between the British Council and the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office.

Together, we will be tackling the United Nations goal 12: Responsible consumption and production. As tutor groups, students will be able to complete their own action research project which will ask them to identify an issue in this field and propose a solution, before putting this into action and testing the outcomes. Students will then present their findings to the community, in what we hope will be a fantastic event to both learn from and celebrate our students and their contribution to achieving this international goal.

Not only will Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form be sharing their action research with the local community, but these will be shared with the partner schools in Tanzania too, thus enabling our students to recognise how they are making a real difference internationally.

So far, students have created a range of 'getting to know you' resources, the best of which will be sent to Tanzania and the local primary schools digitally. Year 7 students wrote a guide to a day in the life of a Year 7 student, sharing their successes, hopes, and stories of their resilience at high school. Year 8 students have written descriptions of tours of the school, describing their favourite parts (it was the Food Hall – surprise surprise!) and anywhere they thought might be interesting, such as the Science labs. Our Year 9 students have written thought-provoking articles about life as a teenager in Braintree, covering all things from mental health to marvellous days out in the local area. Finally, Year 10 students used this as an excellent opportunity to revise the key content they have studied so far by creating posters and leaflets about what we study for GCSE English at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form. The work produced shows the excellent effort students have put in to making a good impression on our partner schools and shows what a range of brilliant students we have here at Notley High School & Braintree Sixth Form!

Finally, I would like to share photos of the best work from each year group overleaf. Their work will be shared with all five of our cluster schools. Well done all!





I used to have a dream of running a coffee shop that had live music events. I'm not sure I would actually be doing that if I wasn't a teacher, but I still love the idea of it!


What did you do to survive the lockdown?

We have been learning about area and volume and students were asked to create a revision resource to assist them in learning all the formulae.




