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




















NUMBER OF ROAD SAFETY EDUCATIONAL COURSES DELIVERED


Students realised that an actual work of art has much more impact when it is seen in reality.





On Tuesday 14 November the Year 13 A level PE class attended the Human Performance Unit at Essex University where they were able to experience what it would be like to study in a university sports science laboratory, whilst enhancing their own knowledge and understanding of key concepts.

In the morning they underwent an exercise physiology session which gave the students the opportunity to deepen their understanding of VO2 max and the energy systems through a number of fitness tests using high level equipment and teaching from the university's PHD students.

All the students took part in a sub-maximal predictive test on a bike to find out their own VO2 max, and then Joe Sheehan volunteered to take on the maximal test on the treadmill where he worked to exhaustion. Before the students could go to lunch they all took part in an anaerobic performance test which demonstrated their power output.

The students came back after their lunch on campus for a second session which focused on biomechanics. This session gave the opportunity for the students to view the extensive range of equipment used to analyse an athlete's performance. Working in groups the students performed either a golf swing or a tennis

serve, they filmed their efforts and then using specialist software they overlaid their performance with that of an elite performer. From here they identified coaching points to improve their performance and then performed the skill for a second time, this time using the software to compare their own two performances. They finished the day with presentations from all the groups to show their outcomes.

It was an excellent day, where the input and enthusiasm from our students meant they gained some great experiences and will be able to apply the knowledge to their own studies.

Year 13 and 11 students attended this year's Model United Nations conference at Richard Hale School in Hertford on Saturday 4 November, representing The United Arab Emirates and Norway in two delegations. Students attending came from schools in London, Norfolk, Oxfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Hertfordshire as well as Essex.

After an opening ceremony and speech on the role of the United Nations and the conference theme of unity at times of political challenge and crisis, delegates worked in their individual committees debating a number of resolutions throughout the morning. Committees included Human Rights, Environment and Disarmament, and delegates forged alliances through written debates, proposed

amendments and argued for their countries' respective positions on each issue before voting. The afternoon focused on the General Assembly, with all delegates attending, and it was very pleasing to see the stand-off between the UAE and Norway in the afternoon debate on renewable energy!

Well done to all the delegates involved, some of whom are becoming experienced MUN-ers and some of whom were first timers at the conference. Particular congratulations must go to Katy Finch who was awarded the 'Angel Award' for her contributions. This recognised her willingness to take difficult but ethical decisions. The conference was challenging and stimulating for all involved.

The Model United Nations

Every year, more than 400,000 people from primary schools, universities, and beyond take part in a Model United Nations (MUN).

By role-playing meetings like the Security Council and General Assembly, participants get a unique insight into how the United Nations works. They research, debate and try to solve some of the world's most pressing problems just like the real thing. Any UN body or agency can be simulated (the Security Council and General Assembly are the most popular).





Braintree Sixth Form celebrated their best ever International Baccalaureate (IB) results in July, with 100% of the Year 13 IB cohort passing the qualification. The highest points score was achieved by Tamsin Sprawling with 39 points. The average point score for the whole IB cohort was 32 points, above both national and international averages

Braintree Sixth Form celebrated some very strong A level and AS level results in August 2017. This year sees the first results for the new reformed linear A levels. Over 96% of all grades were achieved at A*-E grades with over 35% of the results being the highest grades of A*-B. With an increasing intake to the sixth form we are delighted to be able to offer all eligible students in Braintree the opportunity to take A levels and progress to university, college and career based options. The results were very well deserved by the students who have worked very hard and have been ably supported by both their teachers and parents and careers.

Many of our students have now started courses at university, both locally and further afield. Tamsin Sprawling who achieved 39 points in the IB is attending the Royal Agricultural University to study Rural Land Management. Jessica Firman achieved 38 points in the IB and is studying English Literature with Creative Writing at the University of East Anglia. Taylor Golden achieved A*AB and is studying Pure Mathematics at Queen Mary University of London. Hannah Knock is reading Biomedical Science at the University of Surrey after achieving A*AB at A level. Samuel Perry was awarded A*ABB and now reads Mechanical Engineering at the University of Leeds. Eleanor Youngs achieved AABBC, including a B in the EPQ, and is studying English and Journalism at Coventry University. Erin Knight is studying Media, Culture and Society at Loughborough University after being awarded AABB. Lewis Dryden achieved AABB, including B in the EPQ, and will be joining Kent University to study Architecture next year.



The History Department always know Christmas is not too far away when our alarm clocks go off on a cold Friday morning at about 2.30am so that we can be at school for a 4.00am departure to Belgium for our annual Battlefields Trips.

The first of these trips took place on Friday 10 November with the second one on the 24 November. The second trip went out on the 24th and gave 58 students the chance to follow the same itinery.



On the 10 November the weather was due to be wet first thing and then improve and (miraculously) this actually happened with the skies clearing just as we walked out of our first stop at the Passchendaele Memorial Museum. This museum has a fantastic range of artefacts as well as a reconstructed trench system and students took lots of photos and asked lots of questions – in the process we discovered that it took one hour to reload the famously named 'Big-Bertha gun' and looking at the enormous shells you could see why.

The 10 November was actually the 100th anniversary of the taking of Passchendaele Village by the Canadians.

Of this battle one wrote:


"The enemy and ourselves were in the selfsame muck, degradation and horror to such a point nobody cared any more about anything, only getting out of this, and the only way out was by death or wounding and we all of us welcomed either".

As always students were keen to find their own surnames on the memorial wall which lists some 34,000 men without known graves, and we think we did find the name of one student's great grandfather who we understand would have been in action at the end of October 1917 almost on the spot where we were standing. Encouraged to think of the 11,000 plus graves as soldiers on parade many students were visibly awed by the scale of losses shown in just this one place.

Many thanks to Mrs Thurman for giving us an interview during her team's incredibly busy daily schedule.

How long have you been working here for?

19 years

Have you had any previous jobs and what were they?

I have trained as a home-economist, where I had to give food demonstrations.

Also, I have worked for two different German companies, promoting their products where I would go into a kitchen design centre, cook a meal using their ovens and get customers to try the products made. When I got married, I ended up working at the Notley hospital where I worked as a catering manager.

What has been the most enjoyable aspect about your job here?

I think that the most enjoyable thing about working here is the joy of creating food that the students like to eat.

If you weren't the catering manager at this school, what job could you imagine yourself doing now?

I don't really know. I really do enjoy working here.

What made you choose this school over other schools?

There wasn't a particular reason. I was just looking for catering managerial roles and, upon seeing this school, I believed that this was the best option.

How many people do you serve each day?

Around 800-1000 students, on average, as you may see by the queues every break and lunch time.

What do you do in your spare time?

Well, I have a very active grandson! We play Angry Birds and Transformers. In addition, I enjoy cooking, gardening and reading.

What's the most popular food item on the menu?

It used to be chips. However, more recently, it has been southern-fried chicken in a brioche bun.

Why did you choose Love Joes as one of your suppliers?

They have a lot of chicken-based food products, and our student love chicken!

What do you think about the new canteen layout?

It's a lot better for the catering team as we put in a lot of hard work. It's modern and up-to-date. Sales have increased so students also love the new layout.

If you had an unlimited supply of food and money, what changes would you make?

I would make the canteen larger, with new equipment. I would introduce a couple of "snack shacks" outside of the canteen to help stem the long queues as students would not always need to go inside to order food. I would also sell more chicken!

So... lots of people were wondering, what is the secret recipe for your beloved rocky roads?

It's an Essex Schools recipe which we have adapted slowly over the years. We use healthy alternatives, for example low-fat cocoa powder and digestive biscuits. We also add mini marshmallows!



Year 10 Students at The Scholars Programme

Thursday, 12 October 2017

The University of East Anglia hosted the launch day of The Scholars Programme this year, which was attended by 21 of our Year 10 students on 11 October.

Following the success of a similar programme last year with other students in the same year and the year below, we were delighted to put forward even more of our students to enter this round. The focus of The Scholars Programme is to give students an experience of higher education study and to help students develop the skills and knowledge which will help them to progress to higher education if they wish.

The launch of the programme involved a tour of the UEA campus with university students, a talk about university life and applications from a current undergraduate, as well as a session on study skills. Students also reflected on their own learning styles and preferences before meeting the tutor who will be working with them on their studies. Each Scholars Programme involves a series of seven hour-long tutorials with a current PhD student, which will lead to students writing and submitting a 2000 word essay for marking. These are assessed using A level standard criteria and will be awarded university grades from 'First Class' to 'Third' and 'Pass'. These awards will be presented at a graduation ceremony in a different university. Our students will be working with a biologist



from King's College, London and will be examining the science and debates around the genetic modification of crops.

The day was a great introduction to the course and all those who worked with our students were keen to pass on their compliments about their positive attitudes and engagement. We wish them every success as they work to complete their projects.




Year 10 GCSE History trip to London




